Statewide Camp

Highlights were the beautiful three story log lodge itself, the parties Friday and Saturday nights, and the teaching sessions with Gretel Duncing, Julius Horvath, Harold Pelta, Bea Statnick, and Cubby Whitehead.

The weekend started with a French cafe dinner Friday night followed by a party in the main lodge. Saturday included morning and afternoon teaching sessions, with an Hungarian gypsy party complete with singing, campfire, pastries, and a gypsy kidnapping of a gypsy queen, Gretel Duncing. A review session was held on Sunday morning and a brief business meeting during which a constitution for the Florida Folk Dance Council was adopted.

In accordance with this constitution, the Council asks that each folk dance group in the state designate two members to the Central Committee of the Council. These members are to attend Committee meetings and to facilitate flow of information between the Committee and Florida folk dancers. Also they will help plan camps.

On March 30, 31, April 1, the Tampa International Folk Dance Group is sponsoring a workshop of Turkish folk dances with Bora Ozkok. To quote Viltis, Bora is "a native of Adana, Turkey. He danced with the Istanbul Ethnic Dancers of the Istanbul University. In the U.S.A. since the end of 1970, he graduated from U. of C. in Berkeley. Bora has been teaching at various camps and dance institutes. He plays the Zurna, Clarinet, Kaval, Bag pipe, Drums and the Mandolin. He also represented Turkey as a swimmer in the Rome Olympics."
