

PRESIDENTS' DAY WEEKEND CAMP 1999 promises to be fun & exciting as usual. Three very talented musicians: JUDY BARLAS, CHRIS RIETZ & BRUCE SAGAN playing 10 varying instruments with a very flexible repertoire including tunes from Sweden, Greece, Bulgaria, and the Balkan region in general.

Location: the Christian Conference Center, Silver Springs, Florida, on Hwy 40 (Silver Springs Blvd) 10 miles east of 1-75 (exit 69) or 62 miles west of 1-95 (exit 88). This is about one-half mile east of world famous Silver Springs Park. For more information call Jenneine at 352-376-7473. The "EMERGENCY ONLY" number at the Conference Center is 352-236-2302.

Registration: begins at 5 p.m. Friday. A pizza dinner will be served from 6 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. Dancing begins at 7:30 p.m. Refrigerator & microwave are available. Meal tickets will be provided at registration and required at the tray line before each meal. Each day of registration includes three meal tickets. Refunds will be available in full until February 5th at which time food costs (\$21.50 a day) are non-refundable.

Lodging: bring bed linens, pillow, towels, soap, toiletries, and flashlight if you are staying in the cabins. Florida weather can be warm or cold in February (20-60 degrees). Usually bugs are not a problem that time of year. Pets are NOT allowed. There is a swimming pool. Children's fees (<18) include a qualified camp counselor to provide a safe, fun filled weekend of games, activities and entertainment. Children must remain with an adult AT ALL TIMES. Area motels are listed below, make reservations EARLY, and vacancies are rare due to the Daytona 500 race that week.

Culture Corner Scottish Country Dancing

Scottish Country Dancing, danced worldwide today, has a long history.

In Medieval times the social folk dances of the British Isles were variously classified as heys, hornpipes, rounds, jigs, and reels and they varied in their character as did their music from region to region.

In the reign of Elizabeth these dances of the English countryside with their characteristic tunes were very much in favor.

Fifty years after Elizabeth the first collection of these appeared in print. The tunes to which the dances were set and which gave them their names were mostly traditional song tunes, many of them Scottish and Irish.

By the close of the 17th century the formal Country Dances had attained considerable vogue in English as well as Scottish society. At that time almost all of the favorite dances were of the longwise variety suitable for the long narrow galleries of the great houses, and incorporating the ingenious artifice of "progression" of each dancing couple. This style of dance was then exported to France and thence to other European countriesand to which the term "Country Dance" was uniquely applied.

The Scots brought to the longwise progression their music and step tradition and their feeling for movement and made it their own. In the broad valley of the River Spey there was a tradion of dancing of a unique sophistication of technique and grace of style. The grace of the strathspey is a sprightly filagree of control of foot and limb and elevation.

The original accompaniment for the traditional Scottish Country Dances were the violin or fiddle and the Jew's harp-also the Highland bagpipes and among the common people, the melodeon, the early equivalent of today's piano accordion. Many of the dance teachers of that day were fiddlers who composed their own music to fit the dances they composed. That is why many of the dances took their names from the traditional tunes.

After the First World War many traditional dances faded and gave way to things like jazz and swing. In one effort to restore the cultural identity of Scotland Mrs Stewart of Fasnacloich with Miss Jean C. Milligan founded what was to become the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society.

Today that Dance Society has thousands of devotees around the world. Each year the Society publishes a directory of branches and affiliates with the names and addresses of contact persons for each (the secretary). The State of Florida has three brannches and fourteen affiliates. The directory also contains information about events, music available etc. In addition, the RSCDS yearly issues either leaflets or small booklets with directions for newly accepted dances.

Sharpes Assembly Festival 1999

The weekend of October 2, 1998 saw the first Florida Contra Festival sponsored by George and Onie Senyk and the Sharpes Assembly, the contra group that they lead. The Festival was held in Sebring, Florida, at the venerable Kenilworth Lodge which boasts two wooden dance floors. The total attendance was 103, 90% of whom were Floridians. Registration had to be closed for lack of hotel room space.

The program consisted of daytime and evening dances and a dress up ball. There were 17 callers taking part, half of them were trained at the Sharpes Assembly. Special guest instructors were Don and Marie Armstrong and Rusty and Lovetta Wright. Don conducted a three-hour callers seminar for eleven callers. George and Rusty held workshops in basic and experienced contras while Onie Senyk and Catie Geist taught similar workshops in English County Dancing. A special workshop was the odd ball contras of experimental and unique contras created by George, Rusty, Don and Onie.

Plans are being finalized for the next year's festival to be held the first weekend in October 1999 at the same hotel, which has reserved rooms for us to host 120 dancers and callers.

Orlando Internatinal Folk Dance Club and Valencia Cultural Dance Club

We formed a small performing group consisting of: Joe and Lucy Burkemeier, Manuel and Palmira Mora-Valls, and Bobby and I, and we did two shows in the same weekend in September. The first was for an international celebration at a public library branch. The group had a Halloween party on our regular folk dance night in the dance studio that we are still working on. Bobby and I laid commercial vinyl tile over the suspended wood floor. It was finished just in time for the party! Many people wore costumes that completely hid their identity. We had a very good crowd that night
