# COMMENTS FROM AN OLGA PRINCI SCHOLAR BY APRIL DOTSON

I attended my first folk dance camp this year, and it was an unforgettable experience. On the first night, I was completely overwhelmed. There were so many people! Yet by the end of the weekend, I met almost everyone and probably doubled the number of folk dances I know.

The first thing I noticed at camp was how cool it was that there were so many people who all knew the same dances. Dancing is fun no matter the circumstances, but the best dancing, I think, is with a lot of people. I also noticed how nice everyone was, insisting on teaching me everything they knew. There were people who knew hundreds of dances, and I was completely amazed. I enjoyed being able to learn about Bulgaria and Albania as well, since they are not countries we usually learn a lot about in history class.

My favorite moment of the weekend was when "Spock's son" taught us a "Vulcan" folk dance. As a Trekkie, I was thrilled that two of my favorite things, Star Trek and dancing, were combined. I was so excited, I called my parents right afterwards to tell them about it.

Since I have left dance camp, however, something troubles me. For four days, I was able to see how much fun people can have together through dancing. It was wonderful, but it made the lack of dancing in daily life far more apparent. For example, I cannot help but be deeply disappointed every time I think about prom this year, because people will most likely dance separately instead of as a group like it was at dance camp. It would be far more fun, in my opinion, if everyone danced together.

Thus, dance camp taught me two very important things that I need to do. First, I need to learn as many dances as I can so that I can have many more opportunities to dance with people. Second, I need to share folk dance with as many other people as I can so that I always have other people with whom to dance.

#### Minutes of Annual Meeting, Florida Folk Dance Council, Inc.

#### Saturday, February 14, 2015

#### Renaissance Orlando Airport Hotel, Orlando, Florida

- 1. Meeting was called to order by President Jack Seltzer at 12:44pm.
- 2. Minutes were summarized by Secretary, Pat Henderson. Minutes were approved as read.
- 3. Treasurer's Report: Terry Abrahams stated that the Treasurer's Annual Report will be in the next newsletter. The figures look good because of the addition of NFO members joining us.
