Hello everyone and Happy Spring.

We did get a spring this year. I don't even have to have my AC on many nights yet - amazing. I have been very gratified by the many sterling reports I've had about the Spring Fling we set up in Moccasin Lake in Clearwater this year. And they liked us too, so we can go back there. I have already figured out how to make it even better.



I guess many groups are meeting normally now, each with its own take on the risks of Covid. It looks as if the latest variations have had fewer serious complications, with hospitalizations and deaths far below the new infection rate. I don't know if we'll ever get back to the way things were, but that may not be an entirely bad thing. For instance, masks allow me to visit friends who have cats and protect us against allergies, pollution, and environments in which one is most like to catch an illness: hospitals and public conveyances, especially airplanes.

On the teaching front, you may have heard that Jaap and Mea were no longer working together. Jaap will be here, but I had to get to work to find a teacher to replace Mea. After many calls, consultations, and negotiations, I engaged Andy Taylor Blenis. She promised to limit her couple dances to two, and will try to find some Ukranian dances for our program. This is not easy for many reasons. One, is that the state sponsorship of Ukranian dance has made it more performance oriented. And the second is that Ukranian dances can be very strenuous. Hopak, the national dance of the Ukraine, means knee dance. You can check it out on YouTube.

Most of my time has been spent looking for alternative hotels for next year's Camp. The Ramada is still a possibility, but will cost about \$35 more per person before inflation, and many prices are subject to change without notice. So we have been looking into alternatives which Carla and an unpaid consultant have been visiting. We did vote to investigate spending more for something better. The key has been finding hotels with a big enough meeting room and dance floor. A few exist. The money we'd normally spend to rent the floor can pay for a better hotel. Carla will check out the last place this Thursday, and we'll see what kind of deal they can give us. Find the results in the next newsletter!

Last Dance - Jan Lathi by Diana Lathi and Pat Henderson (Italics)

Janice Lillian Rockwell was born on April 8, 1938 in Syracuse, New York. She was an only child who loved her ballet classes and piano lessons. She was the first in her family to attend college at Cortland State University College of Education in Cortland, New York. She then taught elementary school and special education students. As a single woman, Jan started folk dancing as a way of meeting people who shared in her passion for world cultures and dancing. Through an international folk dancing group in Syracuse, Jan met Amarnath Lathi, a handsome swimmer from India, who had landed an engineering job at Bristol Laboratories in Syracuse after completing his masters in chemical engineering at the University of Tennessee. He joined the folk dancing group to meet other people in a setting that would be welcoming to people from different countries. They fell in love and married on July 28, 1962, and continued folk dancing for the rest of their lives.

They eventually had three children and moved to Bridgewater, New Jersey in 1975. Jan and Amar retired to Palm Coast in 1999. They quickly started a folk dancing group in Palm Coast along with Betty Nehemias. They danced at the lovely lakefront clubhouse of Betty's condo. Jan and Amar joined the Orlando International Folk Dance Club and attended our FFDC Camps. They even went on a Folkdanceonthewater trip to Alaska. Bobby and I were their cabin mates

on that trip! Shortly after that, Amar developed an aggressive brain tumor and passed away in 2004, while Jan was fighting her own battle with lymphoma. Determined through her grief, Jan completed chemotherapy and won her battle against lymphoma with the love and support of her Palm Coast and folk dancing friends in Florida. Jan and Betty kept the Flagler Beach active and hosted a wonderful Holiday Party and Flagler Fling in the summer. Jan opened her home to those of us who stayed overnight after a day of dancing and walked on the beach the next day. Somewhere in the mix, there was also time to play games over the weekend. These were some of the best of times as we look back over the years when dancers from several cities in Florida met to have a joyful weekend.

In pandemic times, Jan hosted a Games weekend in June, 2020. Then she would come dance with the Orlando group when she was able and her knee allowed it. She would spend the night with Bobby and me and we would play games before dancing and then again on Thursday morning. I taught her a game one week and she beat me the next! This was in January, 2022 right before she was diagnosed with advanced carcinosarcoma. Jan passed away peacefully on March 9, 2022, after saying goodbye to her three children, Steven, Robert, and Diana Lathi. Her last word was "Happy."

Last Dance - George Arthur Fogg



George Fogg was a World War II Veteran, an English and Colonial Dance Master, and a Dealer of American glassware. He passed away on March 31, 2022 at home in Braintree, MA from a prolonged illness. Born in 1928 in Newburyport, MA, George grew up in the towns of Salisbury and Amesbury. As a young adult, he moved into Boston's South End where he resided for more than a half-century with his life partner, Francis "Frank" Maloney, who preceded him in death in 2010.

While stationed in Germany, George earned the rank of Sergeant and was awarded the Medal of Victory and the Army of Occupation Medal. After, he attended the University of New Hampshire, Durham, graduating with a degree in Agriculture. Over the decades George was employed by Clifton Pierce

Floral Grower, Grossman's Building Materials & Home Improvement, and Schumacher Fabrics & Wall Coverings. Along with Frank, he was the proprietor of Berkeley Antiques in Boston's South End for over a decade. George was a longtime member of the National Grange, being awarded the Golden Sheaf in 1992, to honor his 50 years of continuous service.

George had two great passions in life. The first was English and Colonial American Dance, which were the social dances of the nineteenth Century. He started as a student in his youth, and quickly became a leader, a teacher, and a Dance Master. For decades he would organize and call these period dances locally and across the country, even touring in England. Locally, he held annual Christmas and George Washington Balls. George not only led each dance, but, again with Frank by his side, he set-up, decorated, and prepared the formal sit-down dinners for these authentic period balls. He was a member of the Country Dance & Song Society, New England Folk Festival Association, Pinewoods Morris Men, Black Joker Morris Men, and Revels. He co-authored six collections of 18th Century dances. George stayed extremely active into his mideighties; he danced every set in a ball celebrating his 84th birthday! George was also an honorary member of the NFO.

George's second passion was American-made glassware of 19th & 20th centuries. He began his glass interests in the 1970's, to pick up some extra money. He, and yes Frank, would buy pieces of glass at yard sales then resell them at collector markets. They traveled throughout the Ohio Valley, setting up at the shows and sales of collecting conventions. George was an active member of many groups, authoring articles for publications, speaking at conventions, and working on museum development for the National Duncan Glass Society, the National Cambridge Collectors, the Heisey Collectors of America, the Old Morgantown Glass Collectors' Guild, the Imperial Glass Collectors' Society, The National American Glass Club, and The Museum of American Glass in West Virginia. George also co-authored two books for collectors.

George will be remembered fondly by many for his enthusiasm and spirit for life. He will be interred, later this summer, at his family burial grounds. If anyone wishes to remember George, through dance or glass, a contribution may be made in his name to either: The Traditional Dance and Music Collections Fund, at the University of New Hampshire. Last Dance - Sarah Zimmerman

From looking through past newsletters, we were able to put together a little bit of her dance history in Florida.

Sarah started The Villages group in 2013 with Milan Kutanovski. Within five years, she had grown the group to 40 strong. They not only danced recreationally, but a performance group shared the joy of dancing both within and outside The Villages.

Unfortunately, Covid had a severe impact over the next few years in keeping the group going (though Zoom helped!). Then in 2020, Sarah was diagnosed with Esophageal cancer. She was ever optimistic and hopeful, and by spring of 2021 was "cancer-free." Sarah even went on to have both knees replaced!

But we all know how insidious cancer can be, and back it came, and

Davis, founded Cancer
Antibodies Inc, a nonprofit cancer research
foundation based on a
method he developed for
finding unique targets on
cancer cells that are not
on normal cells. This is
what is missing in the
treatment landscape

today. Finding unique targets means you can kill cancer cells without harming the person.

We have achieved a tremendous breakthrough and were accepted for publication and presentation at the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) Annual Meeting, happening June 2022. ASCO is the largest and one of the most prestigious oncology

organizations in the world, with its annual conference attended by cancer researchers and clinical oncologists from around the world.

The abstract will be published by ASCO on May 26 and we will be presenting at the conference on June 5. I will be sharing more information as it becomes available.
