

Heard It From The Sarasota Grapeviners by Carol Spangler


Many of our Grapeviners are on the move and not just at dance sessions. My husband and I have just returned from a cruise around the British Isles, that included Ireland, Scotland, the Orkney Islands, Normandy Beach in France, and finally a week in London. It was great, but not unusual. Most of my travel stories were fun, but nothing you haven't either done yourselves or heard about from friends. However, Lynda Harris took a vacation that I doubt you have ever heard about or could imagine. Happily, she was willing to write a wonderful story about her passion for sheep dogs...who knew? Here it is, in her own words.

"What can be more fun than sitting in the sun and watching dogs herd sheep all day? Well, ok, maybe a lot of things... but watching the sheep dog trials at the 5-day competition in Meeker, Colorado is one of my favorite things to do on an autumn weekend.

Imagine a field about the size of four football fields. The handler and dog start out together at the bottom of the field. At the top of the field, ten sheep wait. The handler gives the dog the command to fetch the sheep, and off s/he goes at a dead run. The dog comes up behind the sheep and starts them moving down the field, directing them through a set of panels (imagine a large opening in a fence), then down to where the handler is standing, around the handler, back up the field, across the field through two more sets of panels, then back down the field to the handler. Whew!

And that's just the beginning. Now the handler and dog, working together, must separate out the three sheep that are wearing big brightly colored collars. This is tricky, because the sheep want to stay together. When one or two get split out from the flock, they all get nervous and try to get back together again. The dog controls the sheep with body language and intense eye contact. (If a dog should get so frustrated that he nips a sheep, the dog is immediately disqualified.)

Once the three sheep have been successfully 'shed,' the handler tells the dog to put the flock



object is to get the sheep into a small pen -- a plan that the sheep think is a truly bad idea.

Oh, and BTW – there's a time limit to accomplishing all the above.

And for the Finals, there's an extra twist: after the dog fetches the ten sheep and brings them through the panels and down to the handler, s/he is told to "Look back!" because there are ten more sheep waiting at the top of the field. The dog can't see those sheep, and his instincts are to keep his ten sheep in a tight little bunch – not to turn his back on them and run back up the field. This creates a stressful situation for all: dogs, handlers, and spectators.

Lynda tells a great story, because I could see it all in my mind's eye and it actually made me want to check it out. There may be a trip to Colorado for me come autumn!

Next, I'm happy to share another "How I came to Folk Dance and found my true love story." You may recall that I started this series just to hear about how folks got started in International Folk Dance and quickly found out that many of them included a love story, and not just a love of dance.

Wylie and Erica Crawford are snowbirds and when they flew back in this year, I asked them to tell me their story. I had a feeling that it might be a good one. Wylie started folk dancing in the 1960s while attending Antioch College in southwestern Ohio. The dancing took place every Friday night on "Red Square" - a brick surface not best for dancing. But they were all young and enthusiastic. Eventually, he became one of the "troika" of leaders of the group.

When he graduated, he went to the University of Chicago, where dancing was thriving under the leadership of Paul Collins - again, on Friday nights. Continued On Page 7

Winter Folk Dance Day Brings Hundreds to Tartu by Michael Cole

Once a year in December, folk dancers from all over Estonia gather together on the cobblestones of Tartu's Town Hall Square (Raekoja Plats) for the traditional Tartu Winter Dance Day. This year's event saw a record number of people involved, including over a thousand folk dancers.

Usually, the busiest time for folk dance parties in Estonia is in the summer. So, the annual Tartu Winter Dance Day, which took place this Saturday, was one of the few times during the colder months, when hundreds of dancers get all dressed up in their traditional folk costumes and come together to perform.

"It's very nice to dance here, in such a big crowd. After a long time, we can finally come to the Winter Dance Festival, we feel really positive. We can dance ourselves warm, so that's why it's so good to be here," said Ilmar, one of the folk dancers involved in this year's event.



For some participants, this was their third, fourth or even tenth

Tartu Winter dance Day, with the numbers involved growing every year. This year, more than a thousand dancers took part, weaving their way around the square between the huge Christmas tree and glass houses of the Tartu Christmas village.

Kati and Meelis for instance, travelled to Tartu from Viimsi to take part. "It's the first time we've been (for this), so it's a really good feeling," said Kati.

All kinds of traditional Estonian folk dances were performed on the day, some more well-known than others. "We've been searching the archives for a few 'old numbers' that haven't been danced for a long time and made our own arrangements for them here," said Robin Gielen, artistic director of the Winter Dance Day.

"In fact, they're all things like that, which every folk dancer has, at some point, tried their hand at," Gielen said.

Of course, the folk dancing in traditional costumes is all accompanied by live music, which this year was provided by Regina Mänd, Kert Krüsban and Villu Talsi.

"The way musicians play is like in the old days. If they want, they play faster, or they play slower. That makes it more interesting for the dancers too. Musicians don't play the same rhythm all the time, otherwise they would get bored. The same is true for dancers, I think," Gielen said.
