Start by creating an email to be sent to:

regmsg@floridafolkdancer.org

(regmsg stands for "request message.")

Include in that email these three items:

- 1. A Subject Line for the email you are asking to be sent.
- 2. The body text of the email what you want it to say. We won't be editing your text, so please make sure its clear and will make sense to the recipients.
- 3. A contact email or phone number someone the recipient can contact if they want more information about the subject.

Allow at least a **one week processing time** on these distributions, though generally they go out much more quickly than that.

More Travel Adventures by Vicki Kulifay

It has been an exciting couple of months. It started for me with the two week tour of Bulgaria. I returned to Florida for two weeks, then Bernie and I flew off the France and Spain for four weeks. We returned three days before Helene, which was then followed by Milton. Our power was out for six days. We had to replace our roof (it was 14 years old – so it was time). Lots of tree debris and we lost some plantings. But things are almost back to normal.

But I did want to take the chance to share some of our France/Spain trip. Our four weeks was composed of two back-to-back Rick Steve's tours. The first part was the Basque Region of France and Spain, followed by the Best of Spain.

We visited Bayonne (Basque culture) and St Jean Pied de Port (the start of the French Camino) in France. In Spain, we visited Pamplona (running of the bulls), Camino de Santiago (we walked about five miles on the pathway), Abadino (made yogurt from sheeps milk), San Sebastian (incredible beach town), Guernica (where we saw Picasso's masterpiece,

Guernica, represented on tile outdoors in the city), Bilbao (the Guggenheim Museum!), Girona (Game of Thrones sites), Calella de Palafrugell (Costa Brava seaside village), Pals (a Costa Brava medieval village), Barcelona (Park Guell and The Sagruda), Madrid (where we saw Picasso's Guernica in the Museo Reino Sofia), Segovia (the most incredible Roman Aqueduct with 160 arches), Toledo (famous for its metal work), La Mancha (windmills), Granada (The Alhambra), Ronda (the three bridges over gorges), Arcos (Andalusian horses), Cadiz (olives and olive oil), and Sevilla (flamenco and Alcazar).

We saw magnificent churches, fortresses, and palaces. The combination of Moorish, Jewish, and Western architectural styles is awe-inspiring. We ate tremendous food - a lot of paella (both styles - rice or noodles), ham, roasted pork, and drank Tinto de Verona's or Sangria. All in all, a wonderful experience.
